The Series

In a series that dates back to 1940, Lawrence holds a 27-26 lead. The Vikings snapped Grinnell's five-game winning streak in the series with a 24-14 victory in Iowa in 2012. Lawrence holds the longest win streak in the series, winning 10 consecutive games from 1941 through 1954.

Last Meeting

Quarterback Luke Barthelmess ran for two touchdowns and threw for another, and receiver Tyler Mazur had another big day as Lawrence beat Grinnell 24-14 in a Midwest Conference game on Oct. 27, 2012, at Rosenbloom Field.

Barthelmess ran 17 times for 103 yards and topped the 100-yard mark for the second time this season. Barthelmess also completed 14 of 29 passes for 207 yards. Barthelmess, who also topped the 100-yard rushing mark in the season opener against Cornell, became the first Lawrence back since Craig Ebert in 2008 to rush for more than 100 yards in a game twice in the same season.

Mazur caught six passes for 138 yards and a touchdown, and he ran 11 times for 40 yards.

The Vikings built a 17-0 lead and then used a 98-yard scoring drive in the third quarter to help put the game away.

Lawrence took the opening kickoff and marched 70 yards in nine plays for a 7-0 lead. Ben Hartman had a 25-yard run to give the Vikings a first down at the Grinnell three-yard

line, and Barthelmess hit Mazur with a touchdown pass on the next play.

After Grinnell gave up the ball on downs on its first possession of the game, Lawrence took over at its own 21. The Vikings got runs from Barthelmess of 19 and 27 yards, the latter giving Lawrence a first down at the Grinnell 12. Lawrence scored three plays later on Barthelmess' five-yard run for a 14-0 lead.

Lawrence drove all the way to the Grinnell five-yard line on its next possession but had to settle for Cody Robel's 23-yard field goal and led 17-0 at the half.

Grinnell scored on its first possession of the second half with a 62-yard drive for a touchdown. Quarterback Sam Poulos hit Jacob Meixler with an 11-yard scoring pass to trim the margin to 17-7.

After an exchange of punts, Lawrence took over at its own two-yard line with 5:22 left in the third quarter. The Vikings moved 98 yards in 13 plays for a touchdown with

just 15 seconds left in the third quarter. The Vikings converted all three third downs on the drive and got a 24-yard completion to Dominique Dirden to the Grinnell one-yard line. Barthelmess scored three plays later to put Lawrence up 24-7.

Grinnell got a 68-yard touchdown pass from Poulos to Meixler to cut the lead to 24-14 with 6:28 left in the game, but the Lawrence defense held the Pioneers right there.

The Pioneers got the ball back but gave it up just four plays later, and Lawrence got a first down to run out the clock.

Last Week

Trey Yocum ran for 277 yards and scored four touchdowns to lead Monmouth football team to a 31-7 Midwest Conference win over Lawrence this past Saturday at Zorn Stadium.

Yocum carried the ball 31 times for the Scots and averaged 8.9 yards per carry.

Monmouth built a 21-0 lead at the half, and held Lawrence to a season-low 227 offensive yards.

Lawrence quarterback Luke Barthelmess completed 14 of 23 passes for 106 yards, a touchdown and an interception. Barthelmess also ran 15 times for 92 yards.

Safety Sam Wagner had another big day for the Lawrence defense. He matched his career high with 14 tackles, including 10 solo, and grabbed his first interception of the season. Linebacker Andy Paider also had an interception for the Vikings.

Monmouth took the opening kickoff and drove 62 yards in four plays for a touchdown. Yocum ran it in from 23 yards out for a 7-0 lead. The Scots then put together a pair of scoring drives in the second quarter with Yocum scoring from two and five yards to build a 21-0 lead at the half.

The Scots got another Yocum touchdown, this one on a 20-yard run, to lead 31-0 after three quarters.

Lawrence got its lone touchdown of the day, and it was set up by Wagner's interception, which he returned

Barthelmess connected with Dan Dubnicka on a 23-yard touchdown pass four plays later to cut the lead to 31-7. Dubnicka finished with seven catches for 58 yards.

Vikings Update

►Lawrence is looking to bounce back offensively after being held to a season-low 227 yards last Saturday by Monmouth.



►For the first time this season, the opposition actually had the ball more than the Vikings did. Monmouth had the ball for 34:07, compared to 25:53 for Lawrence. Lawrence leads the Midwest Conference in time of possession at 35:04.

►Senior defensive back Sam Wagner (Salem, Wis./Burlington Catholic Central) had his second huge game in a row this past Saturday against Monmouth.

Wagner hit a career-high 14 tackles for the second consecutive week and picked up 10 solo stops. Wagner also had his first interception of the season and that helped set up Lawrence's lone touchdown of the day. Wagner, who now has six career interceptions, leads the team with 58 tackles.

►Senior linebacker Andy Paider (Denmark, Wis./Denmark) picked up a tackle for loss against Monmouth and now has 15.0 on the season. That ranks him second in the Midwest

Conference at 2.14 TFLs per game. Paider also garnered his first interception of the season against the Scots.

►Junior defensive back Dan Taylor (Bridgeport, Calif./Lee Vining) nearly extended his streak of double-digit tackle games to three. Taylor has posted 12, 10 and nine tackles in the past three games. He is third on the team

with 44 tackles.

►The Vikings rank eighth in the Midwest Conference in scoring defense at 31.5 points per game. Lawrence is ninth in total defense at 398.4 yards per contest.

►Senior quarterback Luke Barthelmess (Appleton, Wis./Principia) now has 7,256 career passing yards after throwing for a modest 106 against Monmouth. Barthelmess moved past former St. Norbert stars Cody Craig (7,181) and Ryan Hartman (7,218) on the conference's career passing list. He is just 65 yards from passing former Ripon star Paul Brandenburg (7,320) for seventh place and just 195 from another former Ripon standout, Eric Rich (7,450).

►Barthelmess is the only player in the league who ranks in the top 10 in both rushing and passing. Barthelmess is fifth in the conference at 171.3 passing yards per game and sixth in the league at 81.0 rushing yards per contest.

►Senior wide receiver Dan Dubnicka (Slinger, Wis./Slinger) set his career high with seven catches two weeks ago against St. Norbert and matched it again this past Saturday against Monmouth. Dubnicka grabbed seven balls for 58 yards and a touchdown against the Scots. Dubnicka leads the team with 29 catches for 379 yards and two touchdowns.

►Lawrence ranks seventh in the Midwest Conference in total offense at 321.0 yards per game. The Vikings are 11th in scoring offense at 11.6 points per contest.

Pioneers Update

►Grinnell will be looking to bounce back after a 37-0 loss to visiting Carroll last Saturday. After a scoreless first quarter, Carroll scored three touchdowns in the



second quarter and led 21-0 at the half. The game was scoreless in the third, but Carroll got a safety and two fourth-quarter touchdowns to seal the victory. Carroll running back Lamont Williams had another big game as he ran 34 times for 193 yards and a touchdown.

►Grinnell was held to just 152 yards of offense against Carroll.

►Quarterback Sam Poulos triggers the Grinnell attack. He has completed 103 of 181 yards for 1,072 yards, three touchdowns and four interceptions.

►The top receiving target for the Pioneers is Jacob Meixler, who has caught 34 passes for 423 yards and a touchdown. Jake O'Polka is tops on the squad with two touchdown catches.

►Running back Jacob Bernholtz leads the team with 78 carries for 305 yards and a team-high six touchdowns. Bernholtz is averaging 3.9 yards per carry.

►Grinnell ranks 10th in the Midwest Conference in both scoring offense and total offense. The Pioneers are averaging 14.6 points per game and are at 251.3 yards per contest.

►Junior linebacker David Ternes has piled up a team-high 92 tackles, including 5.0 TFLs. Senior linebacker Jeremy Wiles is tops on the team with 7.5 TFLs.

►Junior linebacker Richard Renteria leads the team with 4.5 sacks. Renteria has 45 tackles, including 6.0 TFLs, on

September 7

Cornell 45, Lawrence 14

MOUNT VERNON, Iowa — The Cornell College football team scored on its first



five possessions and went on to a 45-14 Midwest Conference win over Lawrence University at Ash Park.

Cornell quarterback Juan Flores had a big day as he completed 21 of 27 passes for 275 yards and three touchdowns.

Lawrence quarterback Luke Barthelmess was only 18 of 41 passing for 155 yards, one touchdown and two interceptions. Barthelmess also ran 20 times for 117 yards and a touchdown.

Cornell (1-0, 1-0 MWC) forced a punt on Lawrence's opening possession of the game and moved 56 yards in only three plays for the first touchdown of the game. Flores hit Justin Cox with a 23-yard scoring pass for a 7-0 lead. After another Lawrence punt, Cornell moved 53 yards in six plays, with Flores connecting with Brit Connor from 18 yards out, for a 14-0 lead.

Myron Seabrook then intercepted Barthelmess on the next possession and ran it back 22 yards for a touchdown and a 21-0 lead. After a Lawrence drive stalled at the Cornell 38-yard line, the Vikings punted. Cornell drove 75 yards in seven plays for another touchdown and a 28-0 lead.

Lawrence (0-1, 0-1) got its first score of the game when Barthelmess hit Taylor Mandich from six yards out for a touchdown. The drive covered 88 yards and took 12 plays and trimmed the lead to 31-7 with 3:59 left in the first half. Mandich finished the day with four catches for 34 yards.

The Vikings picked up their other touchdown early in the fourth quarter after a 12-play, 61-yard drive. Barthelmess ran it from four yards out to cut Cornell's lead to 45-14.

Linebacker Brandon Taylor led Lawrence's defense with 10 tackles.

Jeremy Demlow had 14 tackles, including 3.5 tackles for loss, to pace the Rams.

The Vikings actually had one more first down (22-21) and ran 33 more offensive plays than the Rams. Lawrence enjoyed a huge edge in time of possession (37:04-22:56).

September 14

Lake Forest 14, Lawrence 13

APPLETON, Wis. — The Lake Forest College football team blocked two fields in the



final three minutes, including one on the last play of the game, to hang on for a 14-13 Midwest Conference win over Lawrence University in the Banta Bowl.

The Foresters (2-0, 1-0 MWC) also blocked an extra point that proved to be the winning margin.

Lawrence trailed by a point when it took over at its own 36-yard line with 9:51 left. The Vikings took 13 plays to move all the way to the Lake Forest two-yard line before being stopped. Freshman Patrick O'Mahoney lined up for a 19-yard field goal, and the kick was blocked. The ball went out of the end zone and Lake Forest took over at its own 20 with 2:41 left.

Lawrence (0-2, 0-2) was out of timeouts, but the Foresters failed to pick up a first down. Lake Forest did the Vikings a favor by throwing an incomplete pass on third down to stop the clock. Lake Forest punted, and Lawrence got the ball back at its own 23 with 47 seconds left.

Lawrence quarterback Luke Barthelmess hit Sam Wagner with a 32-yard completion on the first play to move the ball to the Lake Forest 45. Barthelmess then ripped off runs of 11 and 24 yards to move to the Lake Forest 10-yard line.

After a pair of incompletions, the Vikings were called for offensive pass interference with six seconds left. O'Mahoney lined up for a 42-yard

field goal, but the kick was blocked again as time expired.

Barthelmess ran 21 times for 124 yards, and he completed 24 of 36 passes for 284 yards and a touchdown. Taylor Mandich grabbed seven passes for 95 yards for the Vikings.

The Lawrence offense piled up 450 yards of offense, including 166 on the ground. The Lawrence defense limited Lake Forest to just 239 yards, and the Foresters were just 3-for-11 on third down.

September 21

BELOIT, Wis. — The Lawrence University football team didn't score in the second half,



and Beloit College pulled away for a 38-21 Midwest Conference victory over the Vikings at Strong Stadium.

The teams went to halftime tied 21-21.

Running back Mason Dixon ran 12 times for 200 yards and three touchdowns to lead Beloit (1-2, 1-1 MWC), which snapped a 13-game losing streak. It was all or next-to-nothing for Dixon, who had runs of 56, 48, 42, 18 and 16 yards but had a combined 21 yards on his other seven carries.

Lawrence quarterback Luke Barthelmeß had 26 carries for 76 yards and completed 15 of 30 passes for 153 yards and a touchdown. Running back Isaac Barthelmeß ran 15 times for 63 yards for the Vikings (0-3, 0-3).

Brimmage carried 29 times and scored a third-quarter touchdown. Blueboys quarterback Michael Bates completed 14 of 25 passes for 195 yards and two touchdowns.

Lawrence quarterback Luke Barthelmeß went 22 of 40 for 230 yards, one touchdown and two interceptions. Barthelmeß also posted his third 100-yard rushing game of the season with 24 carries for 117 yards.

Illinois College (4-0, 3-0 MWC) jumped out to a 13-0 lead in the first quarter with a Bates touchdown pass and a Kurt Frischman interception return for a touchdown. Frischman, a defensive lineman, batted a Barthelmeß pass and hauled it in. He rumbled 75 yards for the score.

Running back Lamont Williams powered the Carroll offense by running 19 times for 216 yards and four touchdowns. Williams, who had touchdown runs of 10, one, 83 and 12 yards, averaged 11.4 yards per carry.

Zach Broberg ran 19 times for 86 yards to pace the Green Knights. Quarterback James Tringali was 13 of 27 passing for 177 yards, one touchdown and one interception. Brian Fliess caught six passes for 103 yards and a touchdown for St. Norbert.

Yocum carried the ball 31 times for the Scots (3-4, 3-3 MWC) and averaged 8.9 yards per carry.

Monmouth built a 21-0 lead at the half, and held Lawrence (0-7, 0-7) to a season-low 227 offensive yards.

Lawrence quarterback Luke Barthelmess completed 14 of 23 passes for 106 yards, a touchdown and an interception. Barthelmess also ran 15 times for 92 yards.

Safety Sam Wagner had another big day for the Lawrence defense. He

matched his career high with 14 tackles, including 10 solo, and grabbed his first interception of the season. Linebacker Andy Paider also had an interception for the Vikings.
