The Series

Lawrence holds a 35-21-2 lead in the series that dates back to 1935. Lawrence had won three consecutive games in the series before Knox defeated the Vikings 63-42 in 2012. The Vikings have won seven of the last 10 meetings with the Prairie Fire.

Last Meeting

Knox's Derek Mortensen ran for 203 yards and six touchdowns, and Lawrence turned the ball over five times in a 63-42 Midwest Conference loss on Nov. 3, 2012, at the Knosher Bowl.

Lawrence lost despite having more total yards (583-520), running 30

more plays and owning a 7:05 advantage in time of possession over the Prairie Fire.

Lawrence quarterback Luke Barthelme completed 27 of 50 passes for 386 yards, three touchdowns and three interceptions. Barthelme broke Jim Petran's career passing yards record of 5,431 yards.

Dominique Dirden caught 11 passes for 184 yards for the Vikings, and Tyler Mazur grabbed eight passes for 104 yards and two touchdowns. Mazur became just the sixth receiver in Lawrence history to pass 2,000 career receiving yards and now has 2,031. Senior running back Ben Hartman carried only nine times but had 89 yards for an impressive 9.9-yard average.

Knox built a 21-14 halftime lead with the help of four Lawrence turnovers in the first half. The Prairie Fire took the opening kickoff of the second half and drove 52 yards for a touchdown and a 28-14 edge.

Another turnover gave Knox the

ball back at the Lawrence 16-yard line, and Mortensen scored two plays later for a 35-14 lead.

The Vikings, who recovered three Knox fumbles on the afternoon, then failed to convert a fourth-and-1 at their own 34-yard line, and Knox took over on downs. Knox scored two plays later and led 42-14. Lawrence's next drive ended on downs at the Knox 31, and the Prairie Fire drove for another score and a 49-14 lead.

Barthelme then ran eight yards for a touchdown and threw a 10-yard touchdown pass to Taylor Mandich to trim the lead to 49-28 after three quarters.

Knox then hit on an 85-yard touchdown pass to crush any hope of a Lawrence comeback. Barthelme ran for another touchdown and threw a touchdown pass to Mazur in the final quarter.

Grinnell made three goal-line stands and used that to secure a 24-

21 Midwest Conference win over Lawrence last Saturday at the Banta Bowl.

Grinnell won despite rushing for only 14 yards and having the ball for less than 22 minutes. Lawrence rolled up 25 first downs and 513 yards of offense, but the Vikings were stopped three times deep in Grinnell territory.

Grinnell quarterback Sam Poulos went 20-for-40 for 363 yards and two touchdowns. Jacob Meixler caught 10 passes for 203 yards and a touchdown and Emmi Sandoval caught seven passes for 93 yards.

Lawrence quarterback Luke Barthelmess ran 17 times for 131 yards, and he completed 32 of 50 passes for 337 yards and three touchdowns. Sam Wagner caught six passes for 106 yards for the Vikings.

Lawrence grabbed a 7-0 lead when it drove 45 yards in six plays on its first possession of the game. Barthelmess hit Tyler Lueck with a 27-yard scoring pass. Grinnell tied it on the final play of the first quarter when Poulos found Meixler, who raced 75 yards for the score.

Grinnell made its first big stand on the ensuing possession. Facing a fourth-and-one at the Grinnell five-yard line, Isaac Barthelmess was stopped short and Lawrence turned the ball over on downs. Grinnell drove down the field and Graham Fisher kicked a 21-yard field goal for a 10-7 lead.

Lawrence immediately grabbed the lead back when it drove 65 yards in six plays for a touchdown. Luke Barthelmess found Dan Dubnicka with a 27-yard scoring pass, and Lawrence led 13-10 at the half.

The Vikings appeared poised to stretch the lead when they moved deep into Grinnell territory early in the third quarter. Luke Barthelmess ripped off a 42-yard run on the drive, and the Vikings later had first-and-goal at the Grinnell two. The Vikings ran it up the middle four times, but Grinnell held and took over at their one-yard line.

The Pioneers then took the lead late in the third quarter with a nine-

play, 69-yard drive. Two key holding penalties on Lawrence kept the drive alive, and Jacob Bernholtz had a one-yard scoring run to give the Pioneers a 17-13 lead.

Lawrence took the ensuing possession and drove to the Grinnell five-yard line. Facing fourth-and-one at the Grinnell two, Luke Barthelmess was sacked, and the Pioneers got the

ball back.

Grinnell tacked on its final score midway through the fourth quarter when Poulos hit Jake O'Polka with a 62-yard scoring pass for a 24-13 edge. Lawrence fumbled on its next possession, but the Vikings got the ball back and moved down the field. Luke Barthelmess hit Isaac Barthelmess with a 10-yard scoring pass to cut the lead to

24-21 with 1:26 left.

Grinnell recovered the ensuing on-sides kick to seal the win.

The Coaches

Mike Barthelmess (Principia 1983) is in his second season at Lawrence and has a record of 2-16 (.111). Barthelmess is in his 11th season overall and has a record of 17-76-1 (.186). Damon Tomeo (Pomona-Pitzer 1999) is in his first season at Knox and has a record of 1-7 (.125).

Vikings Update

►The Vikings will bid farewell to 10 seniors playing in their final home game on Saturday.



Luke Barthelmess, Nic Bouressa, Gabor Bukszar, John Doran, Dan Dubnicka, Robert Jones, Taylor Mandich, Andy Paider, Nick Schubert and Sam Wagner form this year's senior class.

►For the second time this season, Lawrence dominated an opponent but didn't come away with a win. The Vikings rolled up a season-high 513 total yards, compared to 377 for Grinnell. Lawrence had 10 more first downs (25-15) and piled up 176 rushing yards, compared to 14 for the Pioneers.

►Lawrence had the ball for 38:09 against Grinnell, and the Vikings lead the Midwest Conference in time of possession at 35:27. Ripon ranks second in the league at 33:53.

►Senior quarterback Luke Barthelmess (Appleton, Wis./Principia) was named the Midwest Conference Offensive Player of the Year for the second

time this season. Barthelmess won the award after running for more than 100 yards and passing for more than 300 against Grinnell. Barthelmess ran 17 times for a season-high 131 yards. He also completed 32 of 50 passes for a season-high 337 yards and three touchdowns. Barthelmess also won the award for his performance in week two against Lake Forest.

►Barthelmess received honorable mention on the USA College Football Team of the Week. This marks the second time in his career Barthelmess has been named to a national team of the week. He corraled a similar honor in 2011.

►This was Barthelmess' fourth 100-yard rushing game of the season and the sixth of his career. Barthelmess was one yard shy of tying his career high of 132 rushing yards, which he set in the 2012 season opener against Cornell.

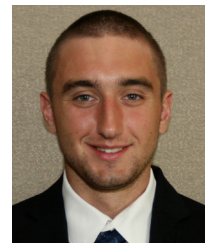
►Barthelmess' three touchdown passes against Grinnell pushes his career total to 57. He is just three shy of

breaking Lawrence's career record of 59, set by All-American Jim Petran.

►Barthelmess now ranks sixth in career passing yards in Midwest Conference history. Barthelmess now has 7,593 yards and moved past former Ripon stars Paul Brandenburg (7,320) and Eric Rich (7,450) this week. Barthelmess is just 104 passing yards from moving past former Beloit standout Brian Maughn (7,696).

►Senior Dan Dubnicka (Slinger, Wis./Slinger) leads the team in receiving. He is tops with 35 catches, 468 yards and three touchdowns.

►Junior wide receiver Tyler Lueck (Glen Ellyn, Ill./Glenbard East) hit career highs with eight catches and 61 receiving yards against Grinnell. He also caught his first career touch-

down pass, a 27-yarder in the first quarter. On the season, Lueck has 27 catches for 194 yards.

►Lawrence ranks fifth in the Midwest Conference in total offense at 345.0 yards per game. The Vikings are 11th in scoring offense at 12.8 points per contest.

►Senior linebacker Andy Paider (Denmark, Wis./Denmark) is closing in on the Lawrence season record for tackles for loss. Paider picked up 2.0 TFLs against Grinnell and now has

17.0 for the season. The record is 18.0, which was set by Matt Frelich in 2007. Frelich leads the Midwest Conference at 2.12 TFLs per game.

►Paider also is tops on the team with 4.0 sacks. He is tied for second on the squad with 49 tackles.

►Lawrence held Grinnell to just 14 rushing yards on 19 carries. That's an average of 0.7 yards per carry. That's the lowest rushing total for a Lawrence opponent since Grinnell ran for just 41 yards on 30 carries on Oct. 15, 2011. That is the second-lowest rushing total that a team has allowed in the conference this season. Lake Forest held Grinnell to zero rushing yards earlier this season.

►Defensive back Sam Wagner (Salem, Wis./Burlington Catholic Central) picked up six tackles vs. Grinnell and leads the team with 64 this season. Wagner is tied with cornerback Zach Eichhorst (Brillion, Wis./Brillion) for the team lead with four pass breakups and five passes defended.

►The Vikings rank eighth in the Midwest Conference in scoring defense at 30.4 points per game. Lawrence is ninth in total defense at 395.8 yards per contest.

Prairie Fire Update

►Knox hasn't played since a 48-24 loss at Illinois College on Oct. 26. The Prairie Fire led 21-20 at the half, but Illinois College scored four second-half touchdowns to easily pull away.



►Running back Derek Mortensen scored two touchdowns in the loss to Illinois College and now has 40 for his career. That tied the Knox record held by Tom Neagle.

►Mortensen rushed for 111 yards against Illinois College and that tied the school record of seven 100-yard rushing games in a season. Mortensen leads the Prairie Fire in rushing with 227 carries for 916 yards, a 4.0-yard average. He ranks sixth in the Midwest Conference at 114.5 yards per game.

►Quarterback Luke Oosterbaan triggers the Knox attack. He is 92 of 186 for 1,047 yards, seven touchdowns and 12 interceptions. Osterbaan is averaging 130.8 yards per game.

►The top receivers for the Prairie Fire are Ilir Emini, who has 28 catches for 415 yards and two touchdowns, and Neal Moon, who has 25 catches for 257 yards and two touchdowns.

►Knox ranks seventh in the league in scoring offense at 17.9 points per game. The Prairie Fire is eighth in total offense at 282.5 yards per contest.

►Sophomore linebacker Mitch Weisenhofer is tops on the squad with 94 tackles. Defensive lineman Austin Finley has a team-high 3.0 sacks, and linebacker Tom Discher is first with 6.5 TFLs. Junior defensive back Will Ruzicka leads the team with two interceptions.

►Knox is eighth in the league in total defense at 393.0 yards per game, and the Prairie Fire ranks ninth in scoring defense at 31.5 points per game.

September 7

Cornell 45, Lawrence 14

MOUNT VERNON, Iowa — The Cornell College football team scored on its first



five possessions and went on to a 45-14 Midwest Conference win over Lawrence University at Ash Park.

Cornell quarterback Juan Flores had a big day as he completed 21 of 27 passes for 275 yards and three touchdowns.

Lawrence quarterback Luke Barthelmess was only 18 of 41 passing for 155 yards, one touchdown and two interceptions. Barthelmess also ran 20 times for 117 yards and a touchdown.

Cornell (1-0, 1-0 MWC) forced a punt on Lawrence's opening possession of the game and moved 56 yards in only three plays for the first touchdown of the game. Flores hit Justin Cox with a 23-yard scoring pass for a 7-0 lead. After another Lawrence punt, Cornell moved 53 yards in six plays, with Flores connecting with Brit Connor from 18 yards out, for a 14-0 lead.

Myron Seabrook then intercepted Barthelmess on the next possession and ran it back 22 yards for a touchdown and a 21-0 lead. After a Lawrence drive stalled at the Cornell 38-yard line, the Vikings punted. Cornell drove 75 yards in seven plays for another touchdown and a 28-0 lead.

Lawrence (0-1, 0-1) got its first score of the game when Barthelmess hit Taylor Mandich from six yards out for a touchdown. The drive covered 88 yards and took 12 plays and trimmed the lead to 31-7 with 3:59 left in the first half. Mandich finished the day with four catches for 34 yards.

The Vikings picked up their other touchdown early in the fourth quarter after a 12-play, 61-yard drive. Barthelmess ran it from four yards out to cut Cornell's lead to 45-14.

Linebacker Brandon Taylor led Lawrence's defense with 10 tackles.

Jeremy Demlow had 14 tackles, including 3.5 tackles for loss, to pace the Rams.

The Vikings actually had one more first down (22-21) and ran 33 more offensive plays than the Rams. Lawrence enjoyed a huge edge in time of possession (37:04-22:56).

September 14

Lake Forest 14, Lawrence 13

APPLETON, Wis. — The Lake Forest College football team blocked two fields in the



final three minutes, including one on the last play of the game, to hang on for a 14-13 Midwest Conference win over Lawrence University in the Banta Bowl.

The Foresters (2-0, 1-0 MWC) also blocked an extra point that proved to be the winning margin.

Lawrence trailed by a point when it took over at its own 36-yard line with 9:51 left. The Vikings took 13 plays to move all the way to the Lake Forest two-yard line before being stopped. Freshman Patrick O'Mahoney lined up for a 19-yard field goal, and the kick was blocked. The ball went out of the end zone and Lake Forest took over at its own 20 with 2:41 left.

Lawrence (0-2, 0-2) was out of timeouts, but the Foresters failed to pick up a first down. Lake Forest did the Vikings a favor by throwing an incomplete pass on third down to stop the clock. Lake Forest punted, and Lawrence got the ball back at its own 23 with 47 seconds left.

Lawrence quarterback Luke Barthelmess hit Sam Wagner with a 32-yard completion on the first play to move the ball to the Lake Forest 45. Barthelmess then ripped off runs of 11 and 24 yards to move to the Lake Forest 10-yard line.

After a pair of incompletions, the Vikings were called for offensive pass interference with six seconds left. O'Mahoney lined up for a 42-yard

field goal, but the kick was blocked again as time expired.

Barthelmess ran 21 times for 124 yards, and he completed 24 of 36 passes for 284 yards and a touchdown. Taylor Mandich grabbed seven passes for 95 yards for the Vikings.

BELOIT, Wis. — The Lawrence University football team didn't score in the second half,



and Beloit College pulled away for a 38-21 Midwest Conference victory over the Vikings at Strong Stadium.

The teams went to halftime tied 21-21.

Running back Mason Dixon ran 12 times for 200 yards and three touchdowns to lead Beloit (1-2, 1-1 MWC), which snapped a 13-game losing streak. It was all or next-to-nothing for Dixon, who had runs of 56, 48, 42, 18 and 16 yards but had a combined 21 yards on his other seven carries.

Brimmage carried 29 times and scored a third-quarter touchdown. Blueboys quarterback Michael Bates completed 14 of 25 passes for 195 yards and two touchdowns.

Lawrence quarterback Luke Barthelmeß went 22 of 40 for 230 yards, one touchdown and two interceptions. Barthelmeß also posted his third 100-yard rushing game of the season with 24 carries for 117 yards.

Monmouth built a 21-0 lead at the half, and held Lawrence (0-7, 0-7) to a season-low 227 offensive yards.

Lawrence quarterback Luke Barthelmeß completed 14 of 23 passes for 106 yards, a touchdown and an interception. Barthelmeß also ran 15 times for 92 yards.
