Last Game

Lawrence finished the 2013 season with a 48-28 loss at Ripon.

Ripon jumped out to a 21-point halftime lead and went on to the Midwest Conference win in the 113th game in the state's oldest college football rivalry.

With the win, Ripon retained possession of the Doehling-Heselton Memorial Trophy.

Quarterback Stephen Covalt led Ripon by running 27 times for 107 yards and a touchdown. Amazingly, Covalt fumbled seven times on the afternoon, but only lost one fumble to the Lawrence defense. Eric Langman added 95 yards on seven carries and he scored twice for the Red Hawks. Covalt completed 8 of 12 passes for 108 yards and two touchdowns.

Lawrence quarterback Luke Barthelmess completed 14 of 37 passes for 285 yards and three touchdowns. Barthelmess also ran 16 times for 110 yards.

Barthelmess finished a stellar career as the most prolific passer in Lawrence history. Barthelmess' 285 passing yards on the afternoon moved him past former Monmouth College star Rob Purlee (8,017) into fourth place in Midwest Conference history with 8,190 yards. Barthelmess now has 62 career touchdown passes and that ranks seventh in conference history. He moved past former Ripon star Brock Bauer (61) and is tied with former Illinois College standout Pete Jennings.

Defensive back/wide receiver

Sam Wagner had a huge day for the Vikings. On defense, he recorded a game-high 12 tackles, including 1.0 tackles for loss. On offense, Wagner caught three passes for 119 yards, and included in that total was a 64-yard touchdown catch.

Ripon led 14-0 in the first quarter when Barthelmess connected with Wagner on the 64-yard scoring pass to cut the margin in half. Ripon then got two touchdown passes from Covalt in the second quarter to stretch the margin to 28-7 at the half.

Lawrence trimmed the lead to 28-14 when Barthelmess hit Tyler Lueck with a five-yard touchdown pass on the opening drive of the third quarter. Ripon countered by scoring the game's next three touchdowns to seal the victory.

Lawrence got a one-yard touchdown run from Isaac Barthelmess and a two-yard touchdown pass from Luke Barthelmess to Dan Dubnicka to finish the scoring.

Vikings Update

Lawrence barks a new chapter in its football history with the 2014 season. This



fall marks the entry of Macalester College into the Midwest Conference for football only. With the addition of Macalester, the league has been split into divisions for the first time since 1997. The North Division consists of Lawrence, Beloit, Carroll, Macalester, RIpon and St. Norbert. The South Division is Cornell, Grinnell, Illinois College, Knox, Lake Forest and Monmouth.

- ► The division winners will meet in the final week of the season in the MWC. Championship Game, which will be hosted by the South Division winner in 2014. The second-place teams will play for third place, the third-place teams will play for fifth place and so on down the line.
- ► This format may be short-lived since Carroll has already announced its intention to leave the MWC for the Col-

lege Conference of Illinois and Wisconsin starting in the fall of 2016.

►The Vikings do return junior running Dalton Sendelbach



back Dalton Sendelbach (Evansville, Wis./Evansville), who is the top returning rusher. Sendelbach carried 87 times for 291 yards, an average of 3.3 yards per carry.

▶ Despite losing receivers Dan Dubnicka and Sam Wagner to graduation, the Vikings bring back a trio of top pass-catchers in Tyler Lueck (Glen Ellyn, III./Glenbard East), Trevor Spina

Nev./ Henderson, Coronado) and fifthyear senior Taylor Mandich (Green Bay, Wis./Southwest). Lueck had 31 catches for 214 yards and two touchdowns last Taylor Mandich season, and Spina



had 22 catches for 247 yards and one touchdown. Getting the tall, athletic Mandich back is a huge boost to Lawrence's receiving corps.

Lawrence also brings three starters back on the offensive line. Standout senior tackles Spencer Swick (Kimberly, Wis./Kimberly) and Luke Zablocki (Pu- Spencer Swick Wis./Pulaski) laski, are joined by junior center Patrick Pierson (Oconomowoc, Wis./Milwaukee Marquette).





- Lawrence finished Luke Zablocki the 2013 season ranked fifth in the Midwest Conference in total offense at 359.4 yards per game. The Vikings were 10th in scoring offense at 15.3 points per contest.
- ▶One of the big changes to Lawrence's offense is the move of sophomore Isaac Barthelmess (Appleton, Wis./North) to defense. After playing running back as a freshman and leading the team in touchdowns, Barthelmess has made the switch to linebacker.
- ►The Vikings do return three senior starters on defense, one at each level of the defense. Fifthyear senior Gabor Bukszar (Naples, Fla./ Gulf Coast) is back at Brandon Taylor defensive end, Bran-

don Taylor (Johnsburg, Ill./Johnsburg) returns at linebacker and Dan Taylor (Bridgeport, Calif./Lee Vining) is back at safety. Brandon Taylor is the team's leading returning tackler after making 70 stops, including 6.5 tackles for loss, in 2013. Dan Taylor had 63 tackles, including 5.5 TFLs. Bukszar had 20, including 4.0 TFLs and 1.0 sacks.

►The Vikings were eighth in the Midwest Conference in scoring defense at 31.1 points per game in 2013. Lawrence was eighth in total defense at 409.2 yards per contest.

Regents Update

▶ Rockford is looking to improve on its one-win campaign in 2013. The Regents' lone vic-



tory was a 34-13 win over Maranatha Baptist. The Regents had a number of close losses, playing teams like Loras, Concordia (III.) and Lakeland pretty tough.

►The Regents have a veteran coach in

Vic Wallace, who is in his 32nd season as a college head coach. He attended Cornell College, a Midwest Conference member, and has 180 collegiate coaching wins at four schools (Rockford, Lambuth, St. Thomas, Minn., William Jewell).

- ▶ Rockford is a member of the Northern Athletics Collegiate Conference, and the Regents return 30 letterwinners from 2013.
- ▶ Rockford is a pretty experienced squad with 15 starters back from 2013.
- The Rockford offense has a star in tight end Dane Kirk, who was named a preseason All-American by USA College Football. Kirk, who was a thirdteam pick, caught a school-record 63 passes for 702 yards and five touchdowns in 2013. Kirk was a secondteam All-NACC pick last season.
- ►The Regents will have a new player triggering the attack as they lost quarterback Aabed Nekrawesh to gradua-

- tion. He was 175-for-329 passing for 2,357 yards, 15 touchdowns and 15 interceptions last season.
- ▶ Rockford does return its top running back, Milton Phillips. Phillips ran 70 times for 301 yards, an average of 4.3 yards per carry and one touchdown.
- ▶The Regents averaged 364.2 yards of total offense in 2013. Rockford averaged 87.6 yards rushing per game, and the Regents threw for 276.6 yards per contest.
- ▶ The Regents also have a star on defense in senior linebacker Seth Swinehart. Swinehart also was chosen for the USA College Football preseason All-America team. A first-team All-NACC pick in 2013, Swinehart led the conference with 88 tackles and picked up 12.5 TFLs and 4.0 sacks.
- ▶The Rockford defense gave up 449.9 yards of total offense per game in 2013. Opponents averaged 233.8 yards rushing per game, and the Regents allowed 216.1 yards passing per contest.

September 7 Cornell 45, Lawrence 14

MOUNT VER-NON, Iowa — The Cornell College football team scored on its first



five possessions and went on to a 45-14 Midwest Conference win over Lawrence University at Ash Park.

Cornell quarterback Juan Flores had a big day as he completed 21 of 27 passes for 275 yards and three touchdowns.

Lawrence quarterback Luke Barthelmess was only 18 of 41 passing for 155 yards, one touchdown and two interceptions. Barthelmess also ran 20 times for 117 yards and a touchdown.

Cornell (1-0, 1-0 MWC) forced a punt on Lawrence's opening possession of the game and moved 56 yards in only three plays for the first touchdown of the game. Flores hit Justin Cox with a 23-yard scoring pass for a 7-0 lead. After another Lawrence punt, Cornell moved 53 yards in six plays, with Flores connecting with Brit Connor from 18 yards out, for a 14-0 lead.

Myron Seabrook then intercepted Barthelmess on the next possession and ran it back 22 yards for a touchdown and a 21-0 lead. After a Lawrence drive stalled at the Cornell 38-yard line, the Vikings punted. Cornell drove 75 yards in seven plays for another touchdown and a 28-0 lead.

Lawrence (0-1, 0-1) got its first score of the game when Barthelmess hit Taylor Mandich from six yards out for a touchdown. The drive covered 88 yards and took 12 plays and trimmed the lead to 31-7 with 3:59 left in the first half. Mandich finished the day with four catches for 34 yards.

Linebacker Brandon Taylor led Lawrence's defense with 10 tackles.

Jeremy Demlow had 14 tackles, including 3.5 tackles for loss, to pace the Rams.

The Vikings acutally had one more first down (22-21) and ran 33 more offensive plays than the Rams. Lawrence enjoyed a huge edge in time of possession (37:04-22:56).

September 14 Lake Forest 14, Lawrence 13

APPLETON, Wis. — The Lake Forest College football team blocked two fields in the



final three minutes, including one on the last play of the game, to hang on for a 14-13 Midwest Conference win over Lawrence University in the Banta Bowl.

The Foresters (2-0, 1-0 MWC) also blocked an extra point that proved to be the winning margin.

Lawrence trailed by a point when it took over at its own 36-yard line with 9:51 left. The Vikings took 13 plays to move all the way to the Lake Forest two-yard line before being stopped. Freshman Patrick O'Mahoney lined up for a 19-yard field goal, and the kick was blocked. The ball went out of the end zone and Lake Forest took over at its own 20 with 2:41 left.

Lawrence (0-2, 0-2) was out of timeouts, but the Foresters failed to pick up a first down. Lake Forest did the Vikings a favor by throwing an incomplete pass on third down to stop the clock. Lake Forest punted, and Lawrence got the ball back at its own 23 with 47 seconds left.

Lawrence quarterback Luke Barthelmess hit Sam Wagner with a 32-yard completion on the first play to move the ball to the Lake Forest 45. Barthelmess then ripped off runs of 11 and 24 yards to move to to the Lake Forest 10-yard line.

After a pair of incompletions, the Vikings were called for offensive pass interference with six seconds left. O'Mahoney lined up for a 42-yard

field goal, but the kick was blocked again as time expired.

Barthelmess ran 21 times for 124 yards, and he completed 24 of 36 passes for 284 yards and a touchdown. Taylor Mandich grabbed seven passes for 95 yards for the Vikings.

September 21 Beloit 38, Lawrence 21

 The Lawrence University football team didn't score in the second half,



and Beloit College pulled away for a 38-21 Midwest Conference victory over the Vikings at Strong Stadium.

The teams went to halftime tied 21-21.

Running back Mason Dixon ran 12 times for 200 yards and three touchdowns to lead Beloit (1-2, 1-1 MWC), which snapped a 13-game losing streak. It was all or next-to-nothing for Dixon, who had runs of 56, 48, 42, 18 and 16 yards but had a combined 21 yards on his other seven carries.

Lawrence quarterback Luke Barthelmess had 26 carries for 76 yards and completed 15 of 30 passes for 153 yards and a touchdown. Running back Isaac Barthelmess ran 15 times for 63 yards for the Vikings (0-3, 0-3).

Brimmage carried 29 times and scored a third-quarter touchdown. Blueboys quarterback Michael Bates completed 14 of 25 passes for 195 yards and two touchdowns.

Lawrence quarterback Luke Barthelmess went 22 of 40 for 230 yards, one touchdown and two interceptions. Barthelmess also posted his third 100-yard rushing game of the season with 24 carries for 117 yards.

Illinois College (4-0, 3-0 MWC) jumped out to a 13-0 lead in the first quarter with a Bates touchdown pass and a Kurt Frischman interception return for a touchdown. Frischman, a defensive lineman, batted a Barthelmess pass and hauled it in. He rumbled 75 yards for the score.

Lawrence quarterback Luke Barthelmess completed 14 of 23 passes for 106 yards, a touchdown and an interception. Barthelmess also ran 15 times for 92 yards.

Safety Sam Wagner had another big day for the Lawrence defense. He

matched his career high with 14 tackles, including 10 solo, and grabbed his first interception of the season. Linebacker Andy Paider also had an interception for the Vikings.

November 9 Lawrence 23, Knox 20

APPLETON, Wis. — Lawrence University quarterback Luke Barthelmess found



Isaac Barthelmess on a 17-yard touchdown pass on the game's final play to lift the Vikings to a dramatic 23-20 Midwest Conference victory over Knox College in the Banta Bowl.

The touchdown pass capped a 69yard drive in the final 49 seconds and was the 59th of Luke Barthelmess' career, which ties him with All-American Jim Petran for the Lawrence record.

Lawrence (1-8, 1-7 MWC) was staring at a three-point deficit after Derek Mortensen finished an 11-play, 83-yard drive with a one-yard touchdown run that gave Knox (1-8, 1-7) a 20-17 lead with just 57 seconds left.

The Vikings took over at their own 31-yard line with 49 seconds left, and Luke Barthelmess hit Sam Wagner with a 13-yard pass. The Lawrence quarterback then really took advantage of what the Knox defense was giving him.

With the Prairie Fire focusing on Wagner, Luke Barthelmess completed three consecutive passes to freshman Trevor Spina along the sideline and he stepped out of bounds to stop the clock each time. Spina caught a 16-yarder to the Knox 40, then caught a 13-yarder to the Knox 27 and grabbed a 10-yarder to the Knox 17 with just three seconds left.

After both teams used their final timeouts, Luke Barthelmess dropped back to pass and scrambled to his right. He threw to his brother Isaac,

a freshman running back, near the corner of the end zone for the touchdown with no time on the clock.

Luke Barthelmess completed 30 of 47 passes for 312 yards and two touchdowns. Luke Barthelmess also ran 12 times for 81 yard and a touchdown. Dan Dubnicka caught eight passes for 98 yards to lead the Vikings, and Spina and John Doran both had six catches for 68 and 58 yards, respectively.

Zach Eichhorst then intercepted Oosterbaan on the next drive and returned it 13 yards to the Knox 12. The Vikings couldn't punch it in, but freshman kicker Pat O'Mahoney converted a 30-yard field goal, the first of his career, and Lawrence led 10-7.

Lawrence stretched the lead to 17-7 in the third quarter. The Vikings marched 61 yards in nine plays for a touchdown. Luke Barthelmess finished the drive with an eight-yard touchdown run with 5:05 left in the third.

Knox trimmed the lead to 17-14 with the help of another Ruzicka interception. Taking over at their own 43, the Prairie Fire got a 30-yard run from Mortensen, and he then scored two plays later on a 27-yard run.

Knox looked like it was going to take the lead midway through the fourth quarter when it drove all way to the Lawrence two-yard line. Facing fourth-and-goal from the two, Knox handed the ball to Mortensen, who was tackled for a loss by Wagner.

Wagner led the Lawrence defense with 13 tackles, including 10 solo and 2.0 tackles for loss. Brandon Taylor picked up 12 tackles, including nine solo, and Dan Taylor had nine stops for the Vikings.

November 16 Ripon 48, Lawrence 28

RIPON, Wis. — The Ripon College football team jumped out to a 21-point halftime



lead and went on to a 48-28 Midwest Conference win over Lawrence University in the 113th game in the state's oldest college football rivalry.

With the win, Ripon retained possession of the Doehling-Heselton Memorial Trophy.

Quarterback Stephen Covalt led Ripon by running 27 times for 107 yards and a touchdown. Amazingly, Covalt fumbled seven times on the afternoon, but only lost one fumble to the Lawrence defense. Eric Langman added 95 yards on seven carries and he scored twice for the Red Hawks. Covalt completed 8 of 12 passes for 108 yards and two touchdowns.

Lawrence quarterback Luke Barthelmess completed 14 of 37 passes for 285 yards and three touchdowns. Barthelmess also ran 16 times for 110 yards.

Barthelmess finished a stellar career as the most prolific passer in Lawrence history. Barthelmess' 285 passing yards on the afternoon moved him past former Monmouth College star Rob Purlee (8,017) into fourth place in Midwest Conference history with 8,190 yards. Barthelmess now has 62 career touchdown passes and that ranks seventh in conference history. He moved past former Ripon star Brock Bauer (61) and is tied with former Illinois College standout Pete

Jennings.

Defensive back/wide receiver Sam Wagner had a huge day for the Vikings. On defense, he recorded a game-high 12 tackles, including 1.0 tackles for loss. On offense, Wagner caught three passes for 119 yards, and included in that total was a 64-yard touchdown catch.

Ripon led 14-0 in the first quarter when Barthelmess connected with Wagner on the 64-yard scoring pass to cut the margin in half. Ripon then got two touchdown passes from Covalt in the second quarter to stretch the margin to 28-7 at the half.

Lawrence trimmed the lead to 28-14 when Barthelmess hit Tyler Lueck with a five-yard touchdown pass on the opening drive of the third quarter. Ripon countered by scoring the game's next three touchdowns to seal the victory.

Lawrence got a one-yard touchdown run from Isaac Barthelmess and a two-yard touchdown pass from Luke Barthelmess to Dan Dubnicka to finish the scoring.
