The Series

In the oldest college football rivalry in Wisconsin, Ripon holds a 59-46-7 edge. The series dates to 1893, and Ripon has won the last 13 meetings.

Last Meeting

In one of the wilder games in Lawrence's football rivalry with Ripon, the Red Hawks pulled out a 56-55 Midwest Conference victory in the season finale in the Banta Bowl on Nov. 10, 2012.

In the 112th meeting between the teams, Ripon scored a touchdown with 33 seconds left to rally from a 13-point deficit in the final 9:53.

Lawrence rolled up 583 yards of offense, and the Vikings were led by senior wide receiver Tyler Mazur and

senior running back Ben Hartman. Mazur caught six passes for 222 yards and three touchdowns, and Hartman ran 14 times for 125 yards for a hefty 8.9-yard average and two touchdowns.

Max Herrmann paced Ripon with 21 carries for 140 yards, and quarterback Tom Sawyer had 22 carries for 107 yards.

Lawrence grabbed a 55-42 lead when quarterback Luke Barthelmess connected with Mazur for a 64-yard touchdown pass with 9:53 remaining in the game. The Lawrence defense then forced a three-and-out, but Dominique Dirden muffed Marshall Zahn's punt and Ripon recovered at the Lawrence 10-yard line.

The Red Hawks scored two plays later on Michael Crusan's six-yard run to trim the lead to 55-49 with 8:17 left.

After a penalty forced Lawrence to start at its own three-yard line on the ensuing drive, the Vikings moved to their own 26. Barthelmess then ripped off a 41-yard run but the play

was called back by a holding penalty. Lawrence was forced to punt, and Ripon took over at its own 43.

Ripon moved 57 yards in 10 plays with Hermann plunging in from a yard out. Jacob Gahart added the extra point to give Ripon the 56-55 lead.

Lawrence got the ball back at its own 32 after the kickoff, but Ripon forced a fourth-down interception to end the game.

The Vikings scored on three of their four possessions in the opening quarter. Lawrence got a 59-yard touchdown catch from Mazur, a 21-yard scoring run from Hartman and a 17-yard touchdown run from Scott Vandeloo and led 20-7.

The teams then traded touchdowns as Mazur caught a 28-yard scoring pass, and Vandeloo added a five-yard touchdown run. Lawrence, which missed two consecutive extra points, went for two after Vandeloo's touchdown as Mazur ran it in for a 34-21 lead at the half.

After a missed Ripon field goal, Lawrence took its opening possession of the second half and scored on Hartman's five-yard touchdown run. The key play in the drive was Mazur's 35-yard catch to the Ripon nine-yard line.

The teams then traded touchdowns as Dirden caught a 46-yard scoring pass, and Lawrence led 48-35 after three quarters.

Junior defensive end Andy Pailer made a career-high 16 tackles, including a sack, for Lawrence. He also forced and recovered a fumble. Freshman defensive back Alex Opgenorth added 13 tackles and an interception for the Vikings.

Last Week

Lawrence quarterback Luke Barthelme found Isaac Barthelme on a 17-yard touchdown pass on the game's final play to lift the Vikings to a dramatic 23-20 Midwest Conference victory over Knox last Saturday in the Banta Bowl.

The touchdown pass capped a 69-yard drive in the final 49 seconds and was the 59th of Luke Barthelme's career, which ties him with All-American Jim Petran for the Lawrence record.

Lawrence was staring at a three-point deficit after Derek Mortensen finished an 11-play, 83-yard drive with a one-yard touchdown run that gave Knox a 20-17 lead with just 57 seconds left.

The Vikings took over at their own 31-yard line with 49 seconds left, and Luke Barthelme hit Sam Wagner with a 13-yard pass. The Lawrence quarterback then really took advantage of what the Knox defense was giving him.

With the Prairie Fire focusing on Wagner, Luke Barthelme completed three consecutive passes to freshman Trevor Spina along the sideline and he stepped out of bounds to stop

the clock each time. Spina caught a 16-yarder to the Knox 40, then caught a 13-yarder to the Knox 27 and grabbed a 10-yarder to the Knox 17 with just three seconds left.

After both teams used their final timeouts, Luke Barthelme dropped back to pass and scrambled to his right. He threw to his brother Isaac, a freshman running back, near the

corner of the end zone for the touchdown with no time on the clock.

Luke Barthelme completed 30 of 47 passes for 312 yards and two touchdowns. Luke Barthelme also ran 12 times for 81 yard and a touchdown. Dan Dubnicka caught eight passes for 98 yards to lead the Vikings, and Spina and John Doran both had six catches for 68 and 58 yards, re-

spectively.

Mortensen had a huge game for the Prairie Fire as he carried 42 times for 246 yards and three touchdowns. Knox quarterback Luke Osterbaan was 8 of 19 passing for 96 yards.

Knox grabbed the early lead when it converted after a Luke Barthelness interception. Will Ruzicka intercepted at the Lawrence 36 and returned it to the 21-yard line. Mortensen ran it in from 14 yards out two plays later, and Knox led 7-0.

Lawrence came up with a turnover of its own when it stopped Mortensen on fourth-and-one at the Lawrence 36 on Knox's next possession. Two plays later, Luke Barthelness hit Dubnicka with a 41-yard pass to the Knox 15. He connected with Spina on the next play for the touchdown and the score was tied 7-7.

Zach Eichhorst then intercepted Oosterbaan on the next drive and returned it 13 yards to the Knox 12. The Vikings couldn't punch it in, but freshman kicker Pat O'Mahoney converted a 30-yard field goal, the first of his career, and Lawrence led 10-7.

Lawrence stretched the lead to 17-7 in the third quarter. The Vikings marched 61 yards in nine plays for a touchdown. Luke Barthelness finished the drive with an eight-yard touchdown run with 5:05 left in the third.

Knox trimmed the lead to 17-14 with the help of another Ruzicka interception. Taking over at their own 43, the Prairie Fire got a 30-yard run from Mortensen, and he then scored two plays later on a 27-yard run.

Knox looked like it was going to take the lead midway through the fourth quarter when it drove all way to the Lawrence two-yard line. Facing fourth-and-goal from the two, Knox handed the ball to Mortensen, who was tackled for a loss by Wagner.

Wagner led the Lawrence defense with 13 tackles, including 10 solo and 2.0 tackles for loss. Brandon Taylor picked up 12 tackles, including nine solo, and Dan Taylor had nine stops for the Vikings.

Vikings Update

►Lawrence sent its seniors away from the Banta Bowl with a smile as the Vikings earned the dramatic victory over Knox last Saturday.

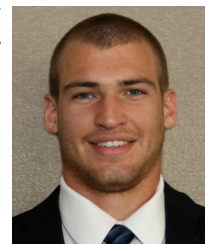


►Senior quarterback Luke Barthelness (Appleton, Wis./Principia) was named the Midwest Conference Offensive Player of the Year for the second straight week and the third time this season. Barthelness won

the award after completing 30 of 47 passes for 312 yards and two touchdowns. He also had 12 carries for 81 yards.

►Barthelness' two touchdown passes against Knox gave him 59 for his career, which tied All-American Jim Petran for the Lawrence record. Barthelness and Petran are tied for ninth place on the conference's career touchdown pass list.

►Barthelness now has 7,905 career passing yards and that ranks fifth in Midwest Conference history. In the win over Knox, Barthelness passed former Beloit star Brian Maughn, who had 7,696 for the Bucs from 2008-11. Barthelness needs 113 yards in the season finale to pass former Monmouth star Rob Purlee (8,017) for fourth place.

►A pair of senior receivers had big performances against Knox on senior

day. Dan Dubnicka (Slinger, Wis./Slinger) caught a career-high eight passes for 98 yards. Dubnicka's previous high was seven catches earlier this season against St. Norbert. Dubnicka leads the team in all receiving categories. He has 43 catches for 566 yards and three touchdowns. John Doran (Northfield, Ill./New Trier) hit career highs with six catches and 58 receiving yards. Doran's previous highs, both earlier this season, were three catches and 34 receiving yards.

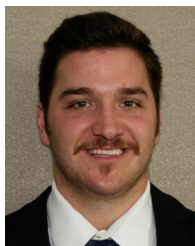

►Lawrence had the ball for 31:53 against Knox, and the Vikings lead the Midwest Conference in time of possession at 35:03. Ripon ranks second in the league at 33:19.

►Lawrence ranks fifth in the Midwest Conference in total offense at 353.1 yards per game. The Vikings are 11th in scoring offense at 13.9 points per contest.

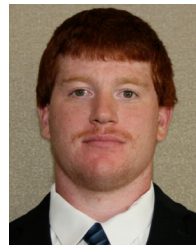
►It's tough to believe any defensive player in the Midwest Conference has been better than defensive back Sam Wagner (Salem, Wis./Burlington Catholic Central) over the past month. In the last four games, Wagner has piled up 47 tackles for an average of 11.8 per contest. Wagner, who made the tackle on a fourth-and-goal play vs. Knox to complete a goal-line stand, also has 6.0 TFLs in those games. Wagner leads the Vikings with 77 tackles.

►Senior linebacker Andy Paider (Denmark, Wis./Denmark) picked up 1.0 TFLs against Knox and now has

18.0 for the season, which ties the Lawrence record set by Matt Frelich in 2007. Paider now has 36.0 TFLs for his career, and that ties him with Steve Heindl for second place on the Lawrence list. Frelich holds the career record at 44.5.

►Paider ranks second in the Midwest Conference at 2.0 TFLs per game. Illinois College's Kurt Frischman is first at 2.11.

►The Vikings rank eighth in the Midwest Conference in scoring defense at 29.2 points per game. Lawrence is eighth in total defense at 391.7 yards per contest.

Red Hawks Update

►Ripon is looking to bounce back from a 49-21 loss at Monmouth last Saturday. Ripon turned the ball over seven times against the Scots, and that included five turnovers in the Red Hawks' first six possessions. Monmouth running back Trey Yocum ran 30 times for 156 yards and two touchdowns to pace the Scots.



►Ripon, with its slot bone offense, leads the Midwest Conference in rushing yards at 287.6 yards per game. Ripon has two of the top-10 rushers in the league. Quarterback Stephen Covalt is sixth in the conference at 114.7 yards per game, and Connor Greenwald is 10th in the conference at 67.9 yard per contest.

►Covalt was just 7-for-17 passing against Monmouth, but he averaged 25.1 yards per completion against the Scots. Covalt also threw three interceptions against Monmouth. On the season, Covalt is 42-for-88 for 643 yards with six touchdowns and six interceptions.

►Tommy Zak is Ripon's top receiver with 29 catches for 362 yards. Nathan Silloway has a team-best three touch-down catches.

►Ripon ranks fourth in the conference in both scoring offense and total offense. The Red Hawks are scoring 27.2 points per game and averaging 399.2 yards per contest.

►Nick Weiss leads Ripon with 55 tackles and is tops on the team with 7.0 TFLs. Andy Krueger leads the team with 2.5 sacks.

►Ripon ranks sixth in the Midwest Conference in total defense at 341.2 yards per game, and the Red Hawks are seventh in scoring defense at 28.2 points per contest.

Doehling-Heselton Trophy

►The trophy that Lawrence and Ripon play for, the Doehling-Heselton Memorial Trophy, commemorates the rivalry between Lawrence head coach Bernie Heselton and long-time Ripon mentor Carl Doehling. Heselton was the Vikings' head coach from 1938-64 and Doehling coached the Redmen (as they were then known) from 1924-55. Heselton had the edge on Doehling, compiling a 10-6-1 record

against Ripon from 1938-55.

►The trophy was donated in 1988 by

Barb Doehling Doran, a 1945 Ripon graduate and the daughter of Carl Doehling. Since its inception, Ripon holds a 19-5 edge in the rivalry.

►The rivalry was at its zenith in the 1950s, when raids on the other campus the night before the game were common. One favorite prank was to paint a blue "L" or red "R" on buildings on the opposing campus. That's when things got a little out of hand and the administration of both schools stepped in. The team began playing for a silver-plated trophy called "The Old Paint Bucket" at that time. No one seems to know how long that continued or what has become of the trophy. It remains missing to this day.

►Lawrence vs. Ripon is one of 51 trophy games played at the NCAA Division III level and one of two games in the Midwest Conference. Knox and Monmouth have been playing for the Bronze Turkey since 1929 and they square off on Saturday as well.

►The 111 combined points scored in the 2012 Lawrence-Ripon game is the most in a game in Lawrence football history. The previous high was 105, which was done in week nine of the 2012 season at Knox.

September 7

Cornell 45, Lawrence 14

MOUNT VERNON, Iowa — The Cornell College football team scored on its first



five possessions and went on to a 45-14 Midwest Conference win over Lawrence University at Ash Park.

Cornell quarterback Juan Flores had a big day as he completed 21 of 27 passes for 275 yards and three touchdowns.

Lawrence quarterback Luke Barthelmess was only 18 of 41 passing for 155 yards, one touchdown and two interceptions. Barthelmess also ran 20 times for 117 yards and a touchdown.

Cornell (1-0, 1-0 MWC) forced a punt on Lawrence's opening possession of the game and moved 56 yards in only three plays for the first touchdown of the game. Flores hit Justin Cox with a 23-yard scoring pass for a 7-0 lead. After another Lawrence punt, Cornell moved 53 yards in six plays, with Flores connecting with Brit Connor from 18 yards out, for a 14-0 lead.

Myron Seabrook then intercepted Barthelmess on the next possession and ran it back 22 yards for a touchdown and a 21-0 lead. After a Lawrence drive stalled at the Cornell 38-yard line, the Vikings punted. Cornell drove 75 yards in seven plays for another touchdown and a 28-0 lead.

The Vikings actually had one more first down (22-21) and ran 33 more offensive plays than the Rams. Lawrence enjoyed a huge edge in time of possession (37:04-22:56).

September 14

Lake Forest 14, Lawrence 13

APPLETON, Wis. — The Lake Forest College football team blocked two fields in the



final three minutes, including one on the last play of the game, to hang on for a 14-13 Midwest Conference win over Lawrence University in the Banta Bowl.

The Foresters (2-0, 1-0 MWC) also blocked an extra point that proved to be the winning margin.

Lawrence trailed by a point when it took over at its own 36-yard line with 9:51 left. The Vikings took 13 plays to move all the way to the Lake Forest two-yard line before being stopped. Freshman Patrick O'Mahoney lined up for a 19-yard field goal, and the kick was blocked. The ball went out of the end zone and Lake Forest took over at its own 20 with 2:41 left.

Lawrence (0-2, 0-2) was out of timeouts, but the Foresters failed to pick up a first down. Lake Forest did the Vikings a favor by throwing an incomplete pass on third down to stop the clock. Lake Forest punted, and Lawrence got the ball back at its own 23 with 47 seconds left.

The touchdown pass capped a 69-yard drive in the final 49 seconds and was the 59th of Luke Barthelmess' career, which ties him with All-American Jim Petran for the Lawrence record.

Lawrence (1-8, 1-7 MWC) was staring at a three-point deficit after Derek Mortensen finished an 11-play, 83-yard drive with a one-yard touchdown run that gave Knox (1-8, 1-7) a 20-17 lead with just 57 seconds left.

The Vikings took over at their own 31-yard line with 49 seconds left, and Luke Barthelmess hit Sam Wagner with a 13-yard pass. The Lawrence quarterback then really took advantage of what the Knox defense was giving him.

Spina caught a 16-yarder to the Knox 40, then caught a 13-yarder to the Knox 27 and grabbed a 10-yarder to the Knox 17 with just three seconds left.

After both teams used their final timeouts, Luke Barthelmess dropped back to pass and scrambled to his right. He threw to his brother Isaac,

a freshman running back, near the corner of the end zone for the touchdown with no time on the clock.

Luke Barthelmess completed 30 of 47 passes for 312 yards and two touchdowns. Luke Barthelmess also ran 12 times for 81 yard and a touchdown. Dan Dubnicka caught eight passes for 98 yards to lead the Vikings, and Spina and John Doran both had six catches for 68 and 58 yards, respectively.

Mortensen had a huge game for the Prairie Fire as he carried 42 times for 246 yards and three touchdowns. Knox quarterback Luke Osterbaan was 8 of 19 passing for 96 yards.

Knox grabbed the early lead when it converted after a Luke Barthelmess interception. Will Ruzicka intercepted at the Lawrence 36 and returned it to the 21-yard line. Mortensen ran it in from 14 yards out two plays later, and Knox led 7-0.

Lawrence came up with a turnover of its own when it stopped Mortensen on fourth-and-one at the Lawrence 36 on Knox's next possession. Two plays later, Luke Barthelmess hit Dubnicka with a 41-yard pass to the Knox 15. He connected with Spina on the next play for the touchdown and the score was tied 7-7.

Zach Eichhorst then intercepted Oosterbaan on the next drive and returned it 13 yards to the Knox 12. The Vikings couldn't punch it in, but freshman kicker Pat O'Mahoney converted a 30-yard field goal, the first of his career, and Lawrence led 10-7.

Lawrence stretched the lead to 17-7 in the third quarter. The Vikings marched 61 yards in nine plays for a touchdown. Luke Barthelmess finished the drive with an eight-yard touchdown run with 5:05 left in the third.

Knox trimmed the lead to 17-14 with the help of another Ruzicka interception. Taking over at their own 43, the Prairie Fire got a 30-yard run from Mortensen, and he then scored two plays later on a 27-yard run.

2013 Game Recaps

Knox looked like it was going to take the lead midway through the fourth quarter when it drove all way to the Lawrence two-yard line. Facing fourth-and-goal from the two, Knox handed the ball to Mortensen, who was tackled for a loss by Wagner.

Wagner led the Lawrence defense with 13 tackles, including 10 solo and 2.0 tackles for loss. Brandon Taylor picked up 12 tackles, including nine solo, and Dan Taylor had nine stops for the Vikings.
