THE COACHES

▶Joel DePagter (Lawrence 1998), the 1997 Midwest Conference Player of the Year and 2009 Midwest Confer-

ence Coach of the Year, is in his ninth season at Lawrence and has a record of 113-91 (.554).

▶Ken Davis (Arizona State) is in his second season at Lake Forest and has a record of 19-18 (.514).

▶Kevin Walden (Knox 2001) is in his fourth season at Knox and has a record of 9-75 (.120). His is in his eighth season overall and has a mark of 52-129 (.287).

THE SERIES

▶The series with the Foresters goes all the way back to 1915, and Lawrence holds a 57-50 advantage. Lake Forest has won three straight against Lawrence, but the Vikings have a 16-8 record against Lake Forest since 2000.

▶In a series that dates back to 1925, Knox holds a 61-57 advantage over

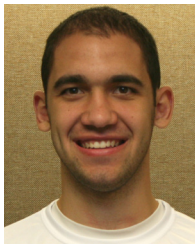
the Vikings. Lawrence has dominated the rivalry over the past decade. The Vikings have won eight in a row and 19 of the last 20 against the Prairie Fire.

LAST GAME

Lawrence put on a dominating performance this past Saturday at Alexander Gymnasium and rolled to an 85-51 Midwest Conference victory over Knox.

Jamie Nikitas led three Vikings in double figures with 21 points, and he added seven rebounds and three steals.

Lawrence's Jeremy Stephani hit four 3-pointers on his way to 14 points, and Ben Peterson scored 11 points and added a game-high eight rebounds.

Braden Adams scored nine points to lead Knox.

Lawrence tied a season high with 12 3-pointers, and the Vikings shot a season-best 40 percent (12-30) from beyond the arc. Lawrence also dominated the glass with a 43-25 rebounding edge as the Vikings grabbed 17 offensive boards.

The Vikings started to pull away late in the first half. Lawrence was up 28-21 when it went on a 17-4 run over the final 5:22 of the half. Connor Weas scored six points in that stretch, Stephani added five and Nikitas had four as the Vikings led 45-25 at the break.

Lawrence then opened the second half with another huge run to seal the victory. The Vikings limited Knox to just four points over the first 10:42 of the second half. Lawrence pushed the lead to 67-29 as Peterson scored six points and George Mavrakis added five during that stretch.

Lawrence would go on to lead by as many as 39 points as all 10 Vikings scored at least four points in the game.

VIKINGS UPDATE

►Standout guard Jamie Nikitas (Glenview, Ill./Glenbrook South) moved past three Lawrence Hall of Famers, head coach Joel DePagter, Matt Miota and Joel Ungrodt into seventh place on Lawrence's career scoring list in the Vikings' win over Knox this past Saturday. Nikitas scored a game-high 21 points against Knox and now has 1,263 points. Next up for Nikitas is former Midwest Conference Player of the Year Adam LaVoy, who is sixth with 1,273 points.



DEPAGTER'S RECORD

Lawrence head coach Joel DePagter is in his ninth season as the Vikings' coach. He is the only person in Midwest Conference history to be named both Player of the Year (1997) and Coach of the Year (2009).

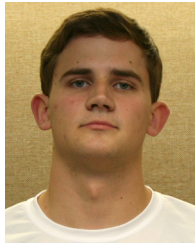

►Nikitas ranks fourth in NCAA Division III and first in the Midwest Conference at 27.1 points per game. Trey Bardsley of Nebraska Wesleyan leads the nation at 29.0 points per game.

►Nikitas also leads the Vikings in rebounding at 7.3 per game, and that ranks seventh in the Midwest Conference. Nikitas also leads the team at 3.4 assists per game and 2.4 steals per game. Nikitas leads the league in steals and is sixth in assists.

►Lawrence played without junior forward Mitch Willer (Sussex, Wis./Sussex Hamilton) due to injury in the game against Knox, but junior forward Pete Winslow (Evanston, Ill./Evanston Township) back. Winslow hadn't played due to injury since Jan. 2 when he was hurt in the first half against Grinnell. Winslow finished with six points, five rebounds and a pair of assists.

►Despite their tallest player being out of the lineup, the Vikings posted their best rebounding game of the season. Lawrence finished a plus-18 against Knox with a 43-25 advantage on the boards. The Vikings pulled down a season-high 17 offensive rebounds, and that led to a 24-4 advantage in second-chance points.

►Lawrence ranks 11th in the Midwest Conference in scoring at 68.7 points per game. The Vikings are fifth in scoring defense at 72.1.

►Lawrence is shooting 44.7 percent from the floor, good for seventh in the Midwest Conference. The Vikings are fourth in field goal percentage defense at 42.4 percent.

►Lawrence is shooting 29.7 percent from 3-point range, and that ranks ninth in the Midwest Conference. The Vikings are ninth in defending the

SCOUTING LAKE FOREST

►Lake Forest has now lost two of its last three after dropping a 74-51 decision



at Cornell this past Saturday. The Foresters, who shot the lights out earlier this season at Lawrence, connected on just 32.7 percent of its shots from the floor, including 27.3 percent from beyond the arc. Eric Porter led Lake Forest with 17 points and Jim Schick added 14 points and eight rebounds against Cornell.

►Lake Forest, which currently holds down the final spot for the Midwest Conference Tournament, has a tough finishing stretch. The Foresters have to go to Monmouth and Grinnell and face the league's top two teams, St.

►Forward Jim Schick leads the Foresters in scoring and is seventh in the league at 17.5 points per game. He is the league's top rebounder at 10.8 per game.

►Forward Orlando Brown, who transferred from Knox, is the conference's best shooter at 63.4 percent from the floor.

►Freshman Danny Sotos is the league's best 3-point shooter at 53.1 percent (17-32).

►Lake Forest is scoring 76.7 points per game, which ranks third in the conference. The Foresters are fourth in scoring defense at 70.2.

►Lake Forest is seventh in the conference in free-throw shooting at 69.5 percent.

►The Foresters are shooting 47.7 percent from the floor, good for fourth in the league. Lake Forest is sixth in field goal percentage defense at 42.8 percent.

►Led by Sotos, Lake Forest is second in the conference in 3-point shooting at 39.0 percent. Lake Forest is fourth in defending the 3-pointer at 32.9 percent.

SCOUTING KNOX

►Knox dropped its 14th consecutive game with its 85-51 setback at Lawrence this past



Saturday. Knox has to make the short trip to Monmouth on Tuesday before it faces the Vikings again this coming Saturday.

►Caylab Herrera leads the team in scoring and ranks sixth in the Midwest Conference at 18.0 points per game.

►Grant Billimack ranks 10th in the league in rebounding at 6.8 per game.

He also is tops on the team at 2.9 assists per game.

►Knox ranks sixth in the Midwest Conference in scoring at 74.3 points per game. The Prairie Fire is 10th in scoring defense at 83.3.

►Knox is shooting 44.0 percent from the floor, good for ninth in the conference. Knox is 10th in field goal percentage defense at 47.9 percent.

►The Prairie Fire is shooting 68.3 percent from the foul line and that ranks ninth in the conference.

►Knox is shooting 36.5 percent from beyond the arc, good for fourth in the league. Knox ranks last in field goal percentage defense at 37.7 percent.

Sabin hit 17-of-25 shots from the floor, including 4-of-6 from beyond the arc, to pace the Red Hawks (10-6, 8-3 MWC).

Lawrence star Jamie Nikitas led four Vikings in double figures with 25 points, and he added eight assists, four rebounds and three steals. Troy Miller and Jeremy Stephani added 13 points apiece for the Vikings (5-10, 2-8), and Mitch Willer chipped in 11 points.

The game featured 10 ties and the biggest lead for either team was five points.

Miller scored eight consecutive points for the Vikings, hitting back-to-back 3-pointers and picking up a layup sandwiched around a pair of Ripon baskets, to give Lawrence a 75-74 lead with 2:34 left. Sabin countered with a driving layup to put the Red Hawks up 76-75 with 1:24 left.

On the ensuing possession, Stephani was going up to shoot a 3-pointer and had the ball knocked away. He caught the loose ball, buried a 3-pointer but was called for a travel so the basket was waived off.

Sabin was fouled and hit two free throws to give Ripon a 78-75 lead. Nikitas countered with a layup with 20 seconds left to cut the margin to one. Ty Ketz hit a pair of free throws for Ripon with 15 seconds remaining to push the lead back to 80-77.

Nikitas then missed a closely contested 3-pointer with 10 seconds left. Ripon grabbed the rebound and Sabin was fouled. He hit one free throw with four seconds remaining to seal the win before Connor Weas hit a 3-pointer at the buzzer for the Vikings.

Lawrence 85, Knox 51

APPLETON, Wis. — The Lawrence University men's basketball team put on a dominating performance at Alexander Gymnasium and rolled to an 85-51 Midwest Conference victory over Knox College.

Jamie Nikitas led three Vikings (6-10, 3-8 MWC) in double figures with 21 points, and he added seven rebounds and three steals. Nikitas moved past three Lawrence Hall of Famers, head coach Joel DePagter, Matt Miota and Joel Ungrodt into seventh place on Lawrence's career scoring list with 1,263 points.

Lawrence's Jeremy Stephani hit four 3-pointers on his way to 14 points, and Ben Peterson scored 11 points and added a game-high eight rebounds.

Braden Adams scored nine points to lead Knox (1-14, 0-10).

Lawrence tied a season high with 12 3-pointers, and the Vikings shot a season-best 40 percent (12-30) from beyond the arc. Lawrence also dominated the glass with a 43-25 rebounding edge as the Vikings grabbed 17 offensive boards.

The Vikings started to pull away late in the first half. Lawrence was up 28-21 when it went on a 17-4 run over the final 5:22 of the half. Connor Weas scored six points in that stretch, Stephani added five and Nikitas had four as the Vikings led 45-25 at the break.

Lawrence then opened the second half with another huge run to seal the victory. The Vikings limited Knox
