THE SERIES

The series with St. Norbert dates all the way back to 1918, and the Green Knights holds a 56-46 advantage. St. Norbert has won 13 consecutive games against the Vikings.

In a series that started in the 1985-86 season, Lawrence has a 33-10 edge over Illinois College. The Vikings have

defeated the Bluboys nine staight times and have won 21 of the last 23.

LAST GAME

Lawrence scored 10 unanswered points midway through the second half this past Saturday and surged on to a 71-57 Midwest Conference victory at Knox.

Jamie Nikitas led three Lawrence players in double figures with 22 points. Nikitas also had game highs with seven rebounds, four assists and four steals. Troy Miller added 17 points and four assists for the Vikings as he hit 5-of-8 from from 3-point range. Jeremy Stephani chipped in with 15 points for the Vikings and knocked down a trio of 3-pointers.

Miller, Stephani and Nikitas combined to go 11-for-21 from beyond the arc.

Braden Adams scored 17 points to pace the Prairie Fire.

Lawrence led by just two at 42-40 when Nikitas drained a 3-pointer with 11:57 remaining. Lawrence's Evan McLaughlin then stole the ball, was fouled and made one free throw for a 46-40 lead.

After Knox missed a jumper, Stephani buried a 3-pointer for a 49-40 edge. Knox turned the ball over on its next trip, and Nikitas followed with another 3-pointer to put the Vikings up 52-40 with 10:07 remaining.

George Mosialos hit a jumper for the Prairie Fire and Robert Suntken followed with a 3-pointer to cut the lead to 52-45, but Miller responded for the Vikings. Miller hit back-to-back 3-pointers to push Lawrence's lead to 58-45 with 7:07 left.

Knox got no closer than nine points after that. The Prairie Fire got the lead down to 67-57 with 2:04 left, but Knox missed its final five shots from the floor after that.

Lawrence held Knox to just 39 percent shooting from the floor for the game, and the Vikings feasted on the foul line. Lawrence went 21-for-26 from the stripe while Knox was 4-for-4.

The game got off to a rough start

for the Vikings as Knox scored the first 10 points. Lawrence didn't get on the board until Nikitas hit a pair of free throws with 13:32 left in the opening half.

The Vikings rallied during a stretch of 4:17 late in the first half to turn a 10-point deficit into a one-point lead. Lawrence trailed 22-12 when the Vikings went on a 13-2 run to take a 25-24 advantage. Miller scored five points during that stretch and capped the run with a 3-pointer with 2:53 left in the first half.

Knox recovered to take a 30-27 lead at the break as Adams hit a long 3-pointer at the buzzer.

VIKINGS UPDATE

▶Standout guard Jamie Nikitas (Glenview, III./Glenbrook South) moved up one more spot on the career scoring list in the past week. Nikitas surged past for-



mer Midwest Conference Player of the Year Adam LaVoy, who was sixth with 1,273 points. Nikitas now has 1,309 points and is just 34 points away from Lawrence Hall of Famer Doug Fyfe, who is fifth with 1,342 points.

▶Nikitas enters play this week with 480 points and is just 15 points awav from breaking John Dekker's season scoring record. Dekker piled up 494 Jamie Nikitas points in the 2009-



10 season. Nikitas also is on pace to shatter Dekker's season scoring average record of 21.5.

▶ Nikitas ranks fourth in NCAA Division III and first in the Midwest Conference at 26.7 points per game.

▶Nikitas also leads the Vikings in rebounding at 7.1 per game, and that ranks sixth in the Midwest Conference. Nikitas also leads the team at 3.4 assists per game and 2.5 steals per game. Nikitas leads the league in steals and is seventh in assists.

▶In addition to being in the top 10 in career scoring at Lawrence, Nikitas also is in elite company in the other major statistical categories. He now has 493 rebounds, passing Erik Borresen this past weekend for 14th place. He needs 30 rebounds to reach Jim Rasmussen, who is 10th with 523. Nikitas just moved past Louie Clark (209) for 10th place on the career assists list with 211. Nikitas passed Kyle MacGillis (173) on Saturday for third place on the career steals list with 174. If Nikitas can reach the top 10 in career rebounding, he would match

scoring defense at 71.0.

Lawrence is shooting 44.8 percent from the floor, good for eighth in the Midwest Conference. The Vikings are third in field goal percentage defense at 42.3 percent.

▶Lawrence is shooting 32.2 percent from 3-point range, and that ranks ninth in the Midwest Conference. The Vikings are eighth in defending the 3-pointer at 36.3 percent.

Lawrence is 10th in the league in free-throw shooting at 68.0 percent.

SCOUTING ST. NORBERT

▶St. Norbert rallied from four points down with two minutes to play this past Saturday to post a 74-72 Midwest Conference win at Carroll. The



win puts the Green Knights in the driver's seat to host the Midwest Conference Tournament. St. Norbert is now two games ahead of the Pioneers and holds the tiebreaker with Carroll with five games left to play.

The win over Carroll extended St. Norbert's win streak over Midwest Conference opponents to 57. That is the longest streak ever compiled by a NCAA Division III team. Wheaton (III.) had a 61-game streak in the old College Conference of Illinois in the late 1950s, but that was before the advent of Division III.

▶St. Norbert is ranked 14th in the latest D3hoops.com Top 25, up two spots from last week.

▶The Green Knights have three players averaging double figures in points, led by guard D.J. DeValk, who is at 15.2 points per game. Junior Ben Bobinski is at 12.3 points per contest and Terrence Garner is at 11.0. Garner is the top rebounder on the squad at 6.2 per contest.

▶St. Norbert is sixth in the conference

in scoring at 73.5 points per game. The Green Knights are tops in scoring defense at 63.4.

▶The Green Knights shoot 48.0 percent from the floor, which is third in the league. St. Norbert is second in field goal percentage defense at 41.9 percent.

The Green Knights are fourth in the MWC in foul shooting at 72.5 percent.

St. Norbert is shooting 37.5 percent on 3-pointers, and that is third in the league. St. Norbert is third in defending the 3-pointer at 33.3 percent.

SCOUTING ILLINOIS COLLEGE

Illinois College won its second straight with a 79-73 Midwest Conference victory over visiting Cornell last Saturday. The Blueboys



knocked off Grinnell, 125-119, earlier in the week.

Sophomore Cody Hildebrand leads the team and ranks 13th in the Midwest Conference in scoring at 14.8 points per game. Junior Tim Schappaugh also is in double figures at 11.9 points per contest.

▶Big man Max Stutsman is tops on the team and ranks ninth in the conference at 6.7 rebounds per game.

▶Illinois College averages 72.1 points per game, good for eighth in the conference. The Blueboys are eighth in scoring defense at 79.1.

▶The Blueboys are the top free-throw shooting team in the league at 76.3 percent. Tim Schappaugh is tops on the team at 87.1 percent.

▶Illinois College is shooting 41.1 percent from the floor, and that is last in the conference. The Blueboys are ninth in field goal percentage defense at 46.7 percent.
